The International Week of Deaf People (IWDP) is an initiative of the World Federation of the Deaf (WFD) and was first launched in 1958 in Rome, Italy. It is celebrated annually by the global Deaf Community during the last full week of September to commemorate the same month the first World Congress of the WFD was held. The International Week of Deaf People is celebrated through various activities by Deaf Communities all around the world. These activities and events welcome the participation of all members of deaf communities, which include families of deaf people, professional and accredited sign language interpreters, peers, as well as the involvement of various stakeholders such as national governments, national and international human rights organizations, and Organisations of Persons with Disabilities.

The theme of the <u>2021 International Week of Deaf People</u> is: **"Celebrating Thriving Deaf Communities"**

The theme of the <u>2021 International Day of Sign Languages</u> is: **"We Sign for Human Rights"**

Monday 20 September 2021 - Cherishing Deaf History

Tuesday 21 September 2021 - Sustainable Deaf Leadership

Deaf communities throughout the world have organized into representative associations to advance their human rights. These organizations need funding, capacity building, and empowerment to carry out the principle of "Nothing About Us Without Us"

Wednesday 22 September 2021 - Sign languages for all deaf learners

Acquisition of sign language from birth from fluent sign language models is critical to the cognitive and social development of deaf children. A strong foundational language is necessary to learn other languages. As many deaf children are born into families who are not yet sign language users, services must be in place to provide sign language learning and support to families so that they can learn and use their national sign languages.

INTERNATIONAL WEEK OF DEAF PEOPLE

This celebration arises from Resolution A/RES/72/161 of the United Nations adopted in 2017, which recognizes the 23rd of September as the International Day of Sign Languages.

The WFD is proud to announce a Global Leaders Challenge to be achieved during the 2021 International Day of Sign Languages. This challenge aims to promote the use of national sign languages by national and global leaders in partnership with their national associations of deaf people.

Your country leaders - might they be Prime Ministers, Presidents, other government officials, members of parliaments, members of city council - should sign in your national sign language "We sign for Human Rights!"

The Global Leaders Challenge is an opportunity for national associations of deaf people to establish and maintain sustainable collaborations with their national leaders through the use of their national sign languages.

National associations of deaf people can contact their leaders and ask them to make a video in their national sign language, with their technical support. Videos should be published on social media with the hashtag #IDSL #GlobalLeadersChallenge tagging @Wfdeaf.

Friday 24 September 2021 - Intersectional Deaf Communities

Intersectionality is a framework for understanding how social and political identities can be seen holistically, and as such, create experiences of discrimination and privilege. These can include aspects such as race, gender, sex, disability, sexuality, religion and language. Deaf communities are both a cultural-linguistic group and members of disability populations. This intersectionality is highlighted in the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities that outlines disability rights and linguistic and cultural rights for deaf people.

Saturday 25 September 2021- Deaf Culture and Arts

Deaf people regularly come together to share their language and culture. Deaf culture involves the behaviours, traditions, beliefs, values, history, humour, art that exists within Deaf communities. Deaf communities are proud of their linguistic and cultural identity and celebrate these identities through cultural and artistic expressions in a variety of artistic mediums.
